John Powers was not only the curator for the Chesterfield Historical Society, he was a member of the Michigan Transit Museum, as well as the owner of a classic Ford Model A and the member of antique car clubs as well. Many of the classic car people at our events were there at John's invitation. John's friendly smile and demeanor as well as his expertise in many subjects will long be missed at our events that he was always there to lend a hand for.

A generous man, always willing to lend a hand to support groups and people in his community, **George Deeby** had numerous admirers and a family that he adored and likewise. He had just become a first time father at the age of 57. George, 58, of Chesterfield Township, passed away on Aug. 22, following a two-year battle with cancer. He is survived by his wife, Roula, and 15-month-old son, George Joseph Deeby Jr. His parents, Thomas and Eleanor Deeby; brothers Thomas A. Deeby, Charles Deeby, and the late John; sisters, Mary (Gerhard) Michler, Gloria (Gary Tandberg) Deeby and sister in-law Julia Deeby.

Deeby was the manager of Tom's Mini Mart in Chesterfield Township, a business he owned and operated for many years alongside his parents. It's a place where many in the community came to know the Deebys as just a wonderful, hardworking and giving family.

"They are just a fantastic family, I'll tell you," said Chesterfield Township Clerk, Jan Uglis. "They are always giving back and if anyone is in dire straits they are always there to help them out."

Deeby was a former trustee on the Chesterfield Township Historical Society board and a member of the township planning commission.

The street leading into the historic village in the township is named "Deeby Historical Drive" to honor George and his family's generosity to the community.

"He's going to be missed as a longtime member of the group and a good friend to the historical society," said society President Eileen Rivard. "And he will be missed as a friend of ours, too."

"Always eager to help out, whether it be in the form of hands-on projects or donations, the Deeby family, George in particular, was extremely loyal to the historical society."

"We could always count on George and his family, they've just really done a lot for us over the years," Rivard said. George was largely responsible for the blacksmith and cobbler shops being added to the historical village.



As the book says, "This photographic record of the St. Clair River relates the common historical experiences of the major communities along the American side of the waterway--from south to north, the St. Clair Flats, Algonac, Marine City, St. Clair, Marysville, and Port Huron.
